Parents are invited to give feedback and input on the school's Comprehensive Plan through regularly monthly meetings with the principal and through a special meeting held in the Spring for parents to learn more about the Comprehensive Plan and Budget for the upcoming school year. Parent feedback is valued by the school's leadership.

- In collaboration with the Grants Compliance Monitor, School-Community Liaisons, Philadelphia Home and School Council (PHSC), Title I Parent Advisory Committee, The Philadelphia Right to Know Educational Task Force, PARENT POWER, and other parent groups, provide workshops to schools on parent engagement.
- Provide professional development <u>by parents/caregivers</u> for new and existing principals and other administrators on how to develop promising partnerships with parents/caregivers.

 - Pre-School parents are invited to all school events and receive the same flyers and communication as all other parents. There are monthly Head Start meetings and the school leadership meets with parents about Early Educational Strategies. We host meetings with pre-Kindergarten students in the spring to introduce them to the Kindergarten staff and to address any questions families may have.
- 5. The McMichael School will take the following actions to conduct, with the involvement of parents, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of this parental involvement policy in improving the quality of its Title I, Part A programs. The Teacher Leader will develop the mini-survey to be used at each workshop. Additionally, the Principal will seek feedback at monthly meetings to evaluate parental involvement strategies. The School will also seek feedback at the Annual meeting for developing the Parent Involvement Policy and Parent-School Compact.

McMichael reviews Academic Content Standards, Academic Achievement Standards, and Assessment information during the Back to School Night. This was held on Sept. 17th. The Annual Title I meeting reviews the Title I requirements. Parents can learn about monitoring their child's progress and working with educators through progress reports, parent-teacher conferences, and at parent workshops geared to teaching parents about FamilyNet.

B. The <u>McMichael School</u> will, with the assistance of the School District, provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training, and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement, by:

McMichael hosts an annual curriculum night to explain StoryTown, Everyday Math, and Prentice Hall Math. Additionally, parents are invited to a workshop about FamilyNet to teach them about how to use the software to monitor their child's progress. The first parent workshop will be held on Nov. 5th.

C. The McMichael School will, with the assistance of the School District, educate its teachers, pupil services personnel, principals and other staff, in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools, by:

McMichael School hosts weekly staff meetings. One week will be focused on working with parents, parent communication/customer service, and when/how to reach out to parents. Additionally, staff will be trained on effective parent-teacher conferences.

D. The McMichael School will, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parental involvement programs and activities with Head Start, Reading First, Early Reading First, Even Start, Home Instruction Programs for Preschool Youngsters, the Parents as Teachers Program, and public preschool and other programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children, by:

Pre-School parents are invited to all school events and receive the same flyers and communication as all other parents. There are monthly Head Start meetings and the school leadership meets with parents about Early Educational Strategies. We host

meetings with pre-Kindergarten students in the spring to introduce them to the Kindergarten staff and to address any questions families may have.

McMichael hosts the Parent Resource Center for West Philadelphia region. Parents can visit to get literature about educational opportunities throughout the region.

The <u>McMichael School</u> will take the following actions to ensure that information related to the school and parent- programs, meetings, and other activities, is sent to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, including alternative formats upon request, and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand:
 - o Parents will see academic material in the Monthly Newsletters
 - o Calendars will be sent out once a month with information concerning the school
 - School Improvement Support Liaison is available to make home visits and phone calls, as needed, to ensure parents understand about programs, meetings, and events occurring at the school.
 - o Flyers will go home to inform parents of meetings, workshops, and activities in clear, parent-friendly language.
 - o Translations are available, as needed, through the District's translation office.
