#### Office of Student Services secures behavioral health supports for students in transition

The Office of Student Services has been working diligently to ease the transition process for students with behavioral health challenges.

The office's goal is to ensure that students who were receiving behavioral health services at schools that closed will have access to the requisite supports at their new schools.

"This will keep academics as the primary focus," said Ericka Washington, Deputy Chief of Student Services and Transition.

Many receiving schools will offer School Therapeutic Services (STS), which provides elementary and middle school students and families with

### District partners with Springboard Collaborative to combat summer learning loss

This summer, the District will launch a partnership with Springboard Collaborative to provide a literacy program to students at four elementary schools.

Research finds that elementary-aged students in low-income communities face huge reading losses over the summer, and that the achievement gap among high school students is mostly related to summer learning loss during the elementary school years.

The Springboard model combines targeted student instruction with parent training in an incentivized system designed to close the literacy gap for students by fourth grade. Student incentives will include educational resources such as books and school supplies.

Springboard will enable students to make significant and lasting literacy gains, encourage parents and teachers to collaborate, and help individuals from closing and receiving schools to foster a renewed sense of community before school starts in September. Springboard Collaborative will operate in the following schools:
