District and City Partners work to ensure Safe Corridors for students

In conjunction with the City of Philadelphia, Town Watch Integrated Services (TWIS), an organization dedicated to making Philadelphia a safer place to live and work, has assembled a group of partners committed to increasing safe corridors for students during the upcoming school year.


WalkSafePHL will support parents and residents of a community to determine a route by which students should travel to and from school by providing training and equipment. Adult volunteers will then monitor the route during the school year, and help to ensure that students arrive safely at their destination.

The District's Office of School Safety has been working closely with TWIS to engage families and communities with the WalkSafePHL program over the summer. "Our office is committed to providing a safe environment for students," said Chief Dorsey, Chief Inspector for The School District of Philadelphia, "and establishing safe corridors is a vital step towards accomplishing that goal."

In addition to TWIS, partners of the Safe Corridor Program include the Bicycle Coalition, BuildON, EducationWorks, the Mayor's Office of Civic Engagement and Volunteer Service, the Mayor's Office of

> Education, the Philadelphia Police Department, the PhillyRising Collaborative, the Office of Public Safety, the School District of Philadelphia and SEPTA Police.

Special Registration and Assessment for New Immigrant Students to begin in August

The Office of Multilingual Curriculum and Programs will help children new to the country to complete the new student registration process with the support of translation and interpretation services in August.

The services will be provided from August 5 to August 30 at the District's Multilingual Assessment Center (MAC) located at 440 North Broad Street, 1st Floor, Suite 1195. Staff will be available to walk parents through the registration process, screen children for ESOL, and provide resources and information about The School District of Philadelphia.

Last year, the MAC assessed and registered over 800 students speaking 40 different languages from more than 70 countries.

United Way grants \$50,000 to support Transition

United Way of Greater Philadelphia and Southern New Jersey (UWGPSNJ) awarded a \$50,000 grant to The School District of Philadelphia last week to help support students from closed schools make a smooth transition into their new classrooms in September.

The grant, a collaboration between UWGPSNJ and Public Citizens for Children and Youth (PCCY), will enable principals from approximately 40 schools to host low-cost programs to welcome and integrate students and parents new to the school.
