Parents were invited to review the school's Parent Involvement Policy on Thursday, October 15, 2015.

- 2. The <u>Isaac Sheppard</u> will take the following actions to involve parents in the process of school review and improvement under section 1116 of the ESEA:
 - *Bi-monthly Chat and Chew with Principal
 - *Monthly SAC Meetings
 - *Budget meeting in the Spring
- 3.
