School Responsibilities

The <u>Isaac A. Sheppard Elementary School</u> will:

1. Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables the participating children to meet the State's student academic achievement standards as follows:

Utilizing the School District Core Curriculum that aligns with the state standards, along with our Sheppard Pride Positive Behavior System.

Leveled Literacy Intervention, Quick Reads, and Reading Mastery are used with at-risk students during daily intervention block. My Math contains both in school and at home components to help struggling students and increase student achievement.

- 2. Hold parent-teacher conferences (at least annually in elementary schools) during which this compact will be discussed as it relates to the individual child's achievement. Specifically, those conferences will be held:
 - September 17, 2015, Back to School Night, Title 1 Meeting
 - December 2-4, 2015 Report Card Conferences & Meetings
 - February 1-3, 2016 -Report Card Conferences & Meetings
- 3. Provide parents with frequent reports on their children's progress. Specifically, the school will provide reports as follows:
 - December 2-4, 2015- Report Card Conferences & Meetings
 - February 1-3-Report Card Conferences & Meetings
 - April 27-29, 2016
 - After June 22, 2016, report cards will be mailed home.
 - Interim reports are issued during midpoint of marking period.

- Parents of students with IEPs are invited to annual meetings with school staff and administration. Parents of non-IEP students who are considered "at risk" are also invited to meetings with school staff to address learning concerns and develop plans for supporting and increasing student achievement.
- 4. Provide parents reasonable access to staff. Specifically, staff will be available for consultation with parents as follows:
 - Appointments can be made through the teacher, staff, or office for consultations that can be scheduled for before school, during preparation periods, RTII periods, or after school.
 - Our Counselor and the Literacy Lead Teacher are responsible for contacting
 parents of students who are experiencing barriers to learning and is available
 for parent contact and to set up meetings with other school staff. The
 Literacy Lead Teacher also presents information about parent involvement
 in student learning during the monthly parent workshops.
- 5. Provide parents opportunities to volunteer and participate in their child's class, and to observe classroom activities, as follows:

During the school year parents are encouraged through our teachers and administration to participate as:

Volunteers- 1st Grade Reading Buddies weekly trip, Chaperones for trips, Library, Turkey Trot, Reading Helpers and Room Parents, PAFA Classroom Art Projects, Monthly Parent Workshops, Friday Parent Classes, and FAST Program.

Parent Responsibilities

We, as parents, will support our children's learning in the following ways:

- Monitoring attendance.
- Making sure that homework is completed.
- Monitoring amount of television my child watches.
- Volunteering in my child's classroom.
- Participating, as appropriate, in decisions relating to my child's education.
- Promoting positive use of my child's extracurricular time.
- Staying informed about my child's education and communicating with the school by promptly reading all notices from the school or the school district either received by my child or by mail and responding, as appropriate.
- Serving, to the extent possible, on policy advisory groups, such as being the Title I, Part A parent representative on the school's School Improvement Team, the Title I Policy Advisory Committee, the District wide Policy Advisory Council, the State's Committee of Practitioners, the School Support Team or other school advisory or policy groups.]

Student Responsibilities

We, as students, will share the responsibility to improve our academic achievement and achieve the State's high standards. Specifically, we will:

Describe the ways in which students will support their academic achievement, such as:

- Read at least 20 minutes every day outside of school time.
- Give to my parents or the adult who is responsible for my welfare all notices and information received by me from my school every day.

The <u>Isaac A. Sheppard Elementary School</u> will:
